

#### Can Wind-up Track Be Rebuilt?

By F. C. NIELAND 515 Palmetto Street New Smyrna, Fla.

Well, posibly. I had a piece of copper wire nearly 3-16 in diameter. A 1-8 inch hole was drilled into one end of this and a shoulder was filed on the other end for a pin Next a section of wind-up track was taken and a 5-16 inch piece of fibre was riveted on the underside of each tie. A 7-64 inch hole was then drilled in the fibre.

This hole came in the center of the circle formed by the 5-16 inch Small square hole in the tie. blocks of 1-8 inch fibre were then placed on the ties, three transverse holes were drilled through wood screw was inserted through the tie from the bottom and riveted where it protruded through the copper wire and then filed and sandpapered smooth.

The hole in one end was just right for the regular pins so a galvanized wire pin was crimped into the other end.
