#### GOD OF THE WEST WINDS

That's what they called her, almost 50 years ago. Zephyr was the name for the Greek god of the west winds and it was the name chosen for the Burllington Railroad's Pioneer Zephyr, the shiny new streamlined train that went into service on Armistice Day 1934, on the run between Lincoln, Nebraska and Kansas City, Missouri via Omaha and St. Joseph.

Declining passenger traffic, by as much as 60%, forced the railroads to do something to perk up business, and the new fast, attractive, clean air-conditioned trains were the answer. The Zephyr wasn't the first of these but it was the Burlington's first. The lead unit of the Pioneer Zephyr housed the engineer's cab, the Diesel engines, a railway post-office section and small baggage compartment. The next unit contained more baggage room, a buffet-grill and a smoking section for 20 people that was only 16 feet long. A third car had seats for 40 more passengers and a solarium-lounge for 12. A fourth car, a dinette-coach, was added in 1938.

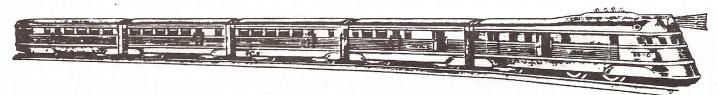
Lionel and American Flyer were quick to jump on the streamlined (band)wagon -- they also needed to spruce up their passenger services. Lionel was first with their U.P. City of Portland 751E in 1934; followed by the Zephyr-style 1065E, Flying Yankee 267W, and Hiawatha 755W, all in 1935, and the U.P. Overland Express in 1936. In 1934, the Western Coil & Electric Company came out with an excellent toy train example of the Zephyr which soon took a back seat, in sales, to American Flyer's officially sanctioned version(s). A.F. made two different cast aluminum engines and added cars as the years went by. They also made similar adaptations of the Zephyr in lithographed sheet metal. These cars were then adapted to make up the A.F. "The Comet" set and the Illinois Central "Green Diamond" streamliners, also in lithographed sheet metal. American Flyer also produced many other large varieties of streamliners including the Milwaukee Road's "Hiawatha" and the U.P. City of Denver, as well as the less expensive windup and electric "Hiawatha" small lithographed versions. The large 12" streamlined cars came in half a dozen color combinations with various steam engines. Also in the 1930's, the Hafner Manufacuring Company made many different windup trains with "articulated" coaches and among these were U.P. City of Denver versions and at least one example of the Zephyr.

The Burlington's <u>Pioneer Zephyr</u> was retired in 1960 but, if you keep your eyes open at monthly TTOS meets, you're apt to run onto some of the progeny. They could become yours!

# Mysterious parcel sets off panic at Toledo company

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) - Libbey-Owens-Ford officials thought they had found a bomb. Police treated the package with care. Twenty people were evacuated from company headquarters.

But the mysterious parcel turned out to contain a toy train, mailed as a promotion by West Virginia.

"I think you could classify this one as a mistake," Toledo police division shift commander Capt. Larry Dyal said yesterday after officers returned the miniature train to LOF.

The package, wrapped in manila paper, surfaced with the rest of the mail yesterday morning at LOF headquarters in downtown Toledo. A mail room worker, who the company would not identify, noticed the package was addressed to LOF President Frederick W. Schwier.

LOF spokesman Rick Rump said it is company policy to screen all incoming packages in the event one might contain a bomb.

The mail room worker scanned the package under a fluroscope, a device for exposing objects to X-rays and viewing them on a screen. Inside he spotted wires and transistors that appeared to be the makings of a bomb.

He called police and notified building security. Toledo officers, including four patrolmen, a sergeant, a lieutenant and a bomb squad officer, A.J. Lee, were dispatched to the 15-story LOF headquarters.

Meanwhile, LOF officials shut down elevators and evacuated the mail-room area in the basement and the first-floor reception area. Rump said about 20 people, visitors and employees, were moved out of the building. Police blocked off the area.

Lee removed the package and placed it in a bomb disposal trailer brought to the scene behind a police vehicle. The package was then taken to an undisclosed bomb detonation area by the police.

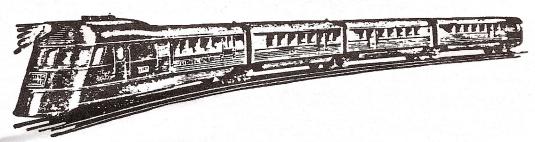
Gingerly unwrapping the box, Lee found inside an "N" gauge model train set, including a locomotive, a caboose and two cars bearing the words, "West Virginia Coal." The package also included a transformer and track.

"At a time like that," said Dyal, "there are generally two reactions - first, a sigh of relief and second, a certain amount of amusement."

In Charleston, W. Va., Dan Green, executive director of the state's Coal Development Authority, said his agency sent out 480 of the train sets in a promotional campaign. He said the trains were mailed in the last 10 days and there have been no complaints.

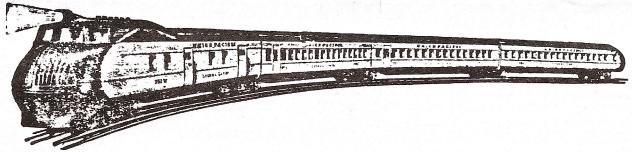
"Obviously, trains ship 65 percent of West Virginia Coal," said Green.

# U.S. Toy Train Firm Plans Plant In Tijuanc

Tijuana, already a major producer of U.S. toys, next month will begin turning out the most American of playthings — electric trains.

The opening of the Lionel electric train plant will help get Tijuana's troubled economy back on track with the creation of 200 new jobs.

But relief is coming at the expense of employees at the General Mills Corp.'s operation in Mount Clemens, Mich.

Steve Kraemer, border zone controller for the corporation, said manufacturing operations for the toy train will be moved from Michigan to realize a significant labor savings in Tijuana.

Administrative offices already have been opened in Chula Vista to oversee Mexican operations.

General Mills Corp., which owns the toy-making company, also will produce the "Strawberry Shortcake" line of toys at the Tijuana plant, which will be operated as a twin plant, or "maquiladora."

Maquiladoras operate under special Mexican regulations that permit the free importation of unfinished products. The products are finished on this side of the border and then exported, with only a small duty applied

Tijuana's new toy factory will operate in that fashion. Toy components imported from Asia will be routed through Chula Vista before being sent to Tijuana for assembly.

The assembled toys will then be sent to the corporation's warehouses in Mount Clemens for distribution to U.S. markets.

General Mills will lease a 71,593square-foot building in Tijuana's La Mesa section recently vacated by another toymaker, Testor Corp. That company, also American, was forced to shut down its Mexican plant early this year because of a dwindling demand for the plastic model cars and airplanes it produces.

Two other large U.S. toy manufac-

turers — Fisher-Price and Mattel Inc. — have had Tijuana maquiladoras for years.

"General Mills' decision to move there reaffirms Tijuana as a desirable place for toy manufacturers," said Terri Cadot, vice president for marketing at Assemble in Mexico, a National City firm that helps U.S. companies open and operate maquiladoras.

Mexico began the maquiladora program in the 1960s to spur economic development along the international border.

Generally, the twin plants are U.S.-owned.
