

If one of these meets does not fit into your schedule (or your budget), we have great news for you - right here in our own backyard is one of the great meets of the year.



Due to starting his custom painting business and pressure at work, he left the board, but continued to assist with the Lionel car for Cal-Stewart. When Lionel agreed to produce a Hopper car, Steve selected the color and railroad name. He painted the 1992 Cal-Stewart souvenir prototype that the club has for advertising purposes.

At his funeral service Steve's brother who is a priest told the thousand attendees how the tragic accident happened. Steve and a fellow worker were lifted 70' in a cage to work on a container. Steve, realizing something was wrong with the cage door, yelled to his partner to grasp something secure and he did. Steve fell 70' hitting protuding iron on the way down, crashing on asphalt. Steve died on the way to the hospital. Another quality of Steve--He gave his life to save another person! The ultimate gift--the gift of life!



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FRIDAY NIGHT FEVER

April 17, 1992

I first met Bob Wall in 1976 at a Friday night TCA meet in Lynwood. In those days, John King would back his truck up to the rear door at Bateman Hall. Then he would put on the stage boxes of trains that had just come out of someone's garage or chicken coop. They would be wrapped in yellowed newspapers and covered with mouse droppings and icicles. Bob introduced himself to me as we stood there waiting for the next item. Over the next 15 years, Bob and I must have driven to 200 or 300 trains meets together.

Some of the trips were more memorable than others on the way to Lynwood. I would often stop to do some nighttime insurance inspections in south central Los Angeles, Lynwood or Compton. Bob would navigate while I drove. We stopped making these trips when we heard that one of our club members was stopped and beaten on the way home from a meet. Ironically, I believe the story goes, it was the cops, not the locals, that did the beating. It was soon after this that TCA moved out of Lynwood.

On one trip (not to a train meet) we came out of a restaurant to find that my 65 Mustang had been stolen. After reporting it to the police, Bob took me back to work in his car. As we drove south on the Golden State Freeway near Dodger Stadium, the thief pulled on the freeway next to us driving my Mustang. We laid back and followed for 30 or 40 minutes in the rain through off-ramps, on-ramps, intersections and under-passes until the bandit discovered he was being followed. This naturally caused the pace to pick up so we were forced to make our move. However, being as how we had spent so much time at train meets, we had missed some of those TV shows which showed you how to conclude a successful pursuit. We lost him! My car was recovered the next day near the Coliseum.

I recall another trip where we were driving east on Highway 30 out of York, Pennsylvania, looking for the turn-off to Hershey on a warm Saturday afternoon. Bob fell asleep and I was a bit drowsy. I only dozed off for a millisec but when I awoke we had missed the turn-off and ended up in Gettysburg. The neat part of train collecting is you get to see a lot of historical places.

Then on one dark rainy night between Baltimore and York, we were driving the least expensive rental car I could find. The road seemed to be a bit slick as we crossed the state line. The rear wheels of this front drive econobox didn't exactly track behind the font wheels. As we hit an extra wet section of highway the car began to hydroplane. As I recall, the rear end passed us up on the left side and sent the car into the center median, which in Pennsylvania consists of 50 feet of deep tall grass. As the car did at least one 360, we could see head lights coming at us from the south bound lanes. When the car finally came to a stop, it looked like a rose parade float There was grass growing out of every opening including bumpers, finders and wheels. There was so much noise from hearts beating we couldn't hear the engine. We got the car back on the road somehow and nursed it the rest of the way to York. The next day we discovered that the rear tires were smaller than the fronts and had no tread We bought two of the best Michilens we could find and charged them to the rental outfit. From that time on we only rented low mileage Lincoln Town cars.

Bob is one of those indestructible types that doesn't believe in seatbelts or low salt diets. In January he discovered he had a medical condition which required that he go for chemo-therapy about as often as he used to go to train meets. On April 15, he finally had the surgery that he was preparing for. The results were better than expected and the outlook is positive. I expect that Bob will be with us in October when we go for our semi-annual exploration of eastern Pennsylvania. We'll miss him this trip.

LAYOUT TOURS

Operating Layouts and Collection of Warren Romberger

Warren has acquired a multi-guaged collection of trains and everything operates. You will see a 400 square foot train room which is literally crammed with operating layouts for several guages. Here Warren has assembled 'O' guage along with 072 Lionel, Ives, Bing and other manufacturers of toy trains. Included are 'S' scale represented by American Flyer and both HO guage and HOn3 guage. If you have any questions about how to operate anything in electric trains, Warren has probably got a working example of it or can tell you what pitfalls to avoid. The main attraction for train buffs cannot be crowded into the trains room. It lies outside and snakes around Warren's land, riding on 12" between the rails track. This diesel powered train can actually carry people and did this for years as a carnival Warren will have this old railrider shined and fired just for your enjoyment. Free private transportation available. See layout forms.

The Toy Train Collection of Harold Moore

One of the most complete collections of Lionel trains in the midsouth United States. If you want to see a house full of trains, then this is one you should not miss. Almost every room in the home, including the halls, is floor to ceiling Lionel trains. Very little that Lionel made is not represented here. There is also a good representation of K-Line, Marx and 'G' guage. Snuggled in among all this is an operating layout 24 feet long. If this was not enough, Harold also has a train shop located in the front of the home and is working on an outside 'G' guage layout.

BUS TOURS

Omniplex and Cowboy Hall of Fame Length of Tour: Approx. 5 hr.

Cost: \$30.00 This tour will take convention goers to the Omniplex in Oklahoma City. The Omniplex houses a fine Air and Space Museum as well as the TTOS Sooner Division's toy trains operating layout. The layout is on display year round and operated daily. It is complete with scenery and operates several guages of toy trains. The layout is known nationally and has received several awards, as well as appeared on television several times. Full size railroad locomotives and rolling stock are also on display, including a dining car once used on the Missouri Pacific Eagle.

The second stage of this tour will take you to the orld famous Cowboy Hall of Fame. The Hall has a large display of Western art and special gallery where you can walk through an authentic sod house, a marshal's office and a gold mine. Real cowboys and cowgirls are immortalized in the Ro-deo Hall of Fame through displays of their trophies, saddles and other memorabilia. Your visit will also include the Western Performers Hall of Fame, where the heroes of Western movies are honored.

The tour will conclude with a drive past the capitol of Oklahoma, which sets nestled among operating oil wells.

The Small Change Railroad

Length of Tour: Approx. 2 hr. Cost: \$15.00 The famed Rock Island lines once roamed the plains of Oklahoma with varnish and pride. Conventioneers will have the opportunity to board the Rock Island Rocket one more time when they tour the Small Change Railroad. The miniature railroad features one-half mile of track on a scenic lakeview acreage just south of Oklahoma City. The passenger equipment is capable of hauling 36 passengers behind locomotives resplendent in the passenger diesel colors of the Rock Island. Enjoy the railroad as you rumble across the plains and across trestles as you reflect back on the days of the passenger trains. The ride is safety inspected by the Oklahoma State Department of Labor Safety Standards Division and fully insured.

NATIONAL RULES PROHIBIT OUTSIDE GUESTS

THE HUENEME AND MALIBU AND PORT LOS ANGELES RAILROAD

A fascinating story of the last Spanish Land Grant owners of Malibu


In 1904 the Southern Pacific Railroad planned to institute condemnation proceedings to get a right-a-way through the privately owned Malibu Rancho, wanting to link the tracks which ended in Santa Monica on the east and in Santa Barbara on the west. The owner of the rancho, Frederick Hastings Rindge, found that he could prevent the Railroad from going through his land by building his own 20 mile narrow-gauge railroad along the coastline. It began at Los Flores Canyon and extended on up the coast, climbing bluffs and leaping canyons past Point Dune, where it dropped down through a cut in the escarpment. From there a low bridge carried the rails over the slough (which usually backed up to Zuma Beach) to the shore, following the coastline until it reached the Ventura County line.--"The Battle of Malibu", Fred Basten

Shortly after Frederick Hastings Rindge death in 1905 his wife, May K. Rindge built the railroad along the cliffs and used it to ship grain and hides to market. "The Huemene and Malibu and Port Los Angeles Railroad with May K. Rindge as president thwarted the Southern Pacific Railroad from building in Malibu. The great fires: 1903, 1933 burnt from the mountains to sea. Rindges lost most everything of value in the 1933 fire, the pottery factory, live stock and the old family home.

The Marblehead Land and Water Company, the corporation May K. Rindge formed in 1926, developed Malibu La Costa and from Carbon Canyon to the Rindge potteries near Malibu Pier to raise necessary money to save Malibu from development. Due to increasing pressure by the state highway department to build a highway through her property, May K. Rindge hired a posse of armed guards to protect her property from the state. This developed into a costly legal battle that finally ended up in the United States Supreme Court with Rindge losing More than that, she lost all of her nine million dollar trust account to pay off lawyers.

Her daughter, Rhoda and son-in-law, Merritt Huntley Adamson started a dairy business to make a living since the family fortune was being spent in the courts.--ADOHR FARMS (Rhoda spelled backwards) .-"The Malibu", W. W. Robinson







ITEMS OF INTEREST

REPORT ON THE RECENT 4th ANNUAL RAILWAY PRESERVATION SYMPOSIUM

The popular and ever-expanding symposium was the joint effort of the California State Railroad Museum and the Pacific Coast Chapter, Railway and Locomotive Historical Society who, this year, added for the first time a new electric railway/traction component. One entire day was devoted to electric railway preservation, including a lecture-tour and workshop at the nearby Western Railway Museum located at Rio Vista Junction and run by the bay Area Electric Railway Association. Subjects included Rotary Power converters, Substations, and Over head line Maintenance. The faculty included: WARD KIMBALL, Chief Animator (retired) for Walt Disney Productions and one of the nation's early railway preservationists. Established in the late 1930's, Ward;s privately owned narrow gauge Grizzly Flats Railroad pioneered in the preservation and interpretation of historic railway relics. Another faculty member was SCOTT BRITTEN, group leader for the just-completed restoration of former A.T.&S.F. Northern No. 3751
